ECNT is the peak non-government environment group in the Territory. We rely heavily on our members, both to help direct and run the Environment Centre's activities and for the contribution that membership subscriptions make to our limited resources. ECNT works to:

- » promote environmental awareness;

- » provide information via our library and files;
- » lobby government and industry;
- » inform the public on environmental issues via the media;
- » assist other groups to protect the environment;
- » liaise with other conservationists, both nationally and internationally;
- » publish a regular and informative newsletter; and
- » support the recognition of Aboriginal rights and aspirations.
